Vicar's Letter

As you read this Spring is upon us. Buds are breaking open on the trees, blossom is adding rich colour to the world around us and nature is breaking into a second second

is bursting into new life.

It is around this time that Rita and I attend a conference at Butlins called Spring Harvest. Each day starts with a Bible Study talk led by a prominent leader in the church. One year it was led by a Baptist Minister called Andy Caldwell. One morning he told us how he had always wanted to be a fighter pilot and eventually join Military Intelligence. All was going well until he started his pre-Cranwell fitness course and failed miserably. Andy had asthma and for that reason he couldn't be in the airforce. His misery deepened when, despite his protestations that he was willing to do any job in the airforce, he was told he wasn't fit enough even to be a bandsman! Then, just when it seemed it couldn't get any worse, his girlfriend of some years dumped him - for a flying instructor!!

It was at this low point in his life that God intervened. He was walking in the woods and in his desperation shouted at the trees, "God, if you really do exist, where are you?" He heard a voice, not from outside himself, but a voice nevertheless, which told him to pick up an acorn lying on the ground beside him. God then said to him, "Just as you have picked up this acorn, I have picked you up and I hold you in my hand, you are mine." This was the beginning of a life-changing

experience for Andy.

The difference in his life was not brought about by great success as a pilot, nor by clawing his way to the top as the world so often insists is the way to succeed. His life was changed by the presence of God in his life. Nature doesn't have to try to produce blossom, fruit or beautiful flowers. It is all the inevitable result of the power within that is part of creation.

The prophet Jeremiah reminds us of this truth in chapter 29 and verse 11: For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

BARTON MILLS BAPTIST CHURCH



Again, I make no excuse of mentioning the glorious return of the daffodils on the Playing Field on our way to Mildenhall. When I went to work it was always a good start to the day to see them swaying in the sunlight and now every year, still they come. Many years ago, I was fascinated to read the following article in a devotional booklet. I thought it would bear repeating, especially as Sir Alexander Fleming lived in Barton Mills from 1921 to 1955. I hope you will find it as interesting as I did and think seriously about what it tells us.

A gathering of friends at an English estate nearly turned to tragedy when one of the children strayed into deep water. The gardener heard the cries of help, plunged in and rescued the drowning child. That youngster's name was Winston Churchill. His grateful parents asked the gardener what they could do to reward him. He hesitated, then said, "I wish my son could go to college someday and become a doctor". "We'll see to it," Churchill's grateful parents promised. Years later, while Sir Winston was Prime Minister of England, he was stricken with pneumonia. The country's best physician was summoned. His name was Alexander Fleming, the man who discovered and developed penicillin. He was also the son of that gardener who had saved young Winston from drowning. Later Churchill remarked, "Rarely has one man owed his life twice to the same person".

As we celebrate the festival of Easter, let us remember how much God loved us when He sent His only Son, the Lord Jesus, to intervene on our behalf. He was crucified and left for dead, removed from the cross and put in a borrowed grave. On the third day He rose from the dead, saving us at great cost to Himself. If skeptics had questioned Jesus after His resurrection, all He would have had to do is show them His bruised, nail pierced hands. They are ample proof that He has given Himself for each one of us. What have you done with God's love? Have you accepted the sacrifice of His Son on the cross for your sins? It's not enough just to know about it. You must say from your heart, "He died for me!"

NATURE NOTES

A YEAR IN PROVENCE (Well actually a week!)

In late February Sue and I spent a week in Provence in Southern France. The purpose of our visit was to see some wild birds which winter in that region, notably the Wallcreeper and the Alpine accentor. We stayed in St-Remy-de-Provence, a town of about 10,000 residents, famously where Vincent van Gogh was a patient in the Saint-Paul psychiatric hospital from 1889 to 1890. At that location he painted one of his best-known pictures, the Starry Night. His fascination with the local Cypress trees, still common there today, is represented in many of his works.


Our first port of call was the ancient fortified town of Les Baux de Provence which has many former dwellings that were hewn out of the limestone rock. Traces of habitation date back to 6,000 BC. Aluminium ore was discovered there in 1821 and named bauxite after the town. This commune is a well-known wintering site for Wallcreeper and Alpine accentor. The former is a bird about 15 to 17cm long, mainly blue-grey in colour but with a bright crimson patch on the wing which is evident in flight. As its name suggests it lives on cliffs and rock faces where, much like the Treecreeper, it searches nooks and crannies for insect food with its long, down-curved bill. The latter species is much like a very large Dunnock but has much brighter plumage with a rusty-red belly and flanks and a prominent white wing bar. Both species breed in the high mountains but winter at lower altitudes. The wallcreeper in particular is very hard to find due to its habits so not surprisingly we failed to find one on that occasion. However, we did manage to find one later in the week.

At Pont du Gard, a Roman aqueduct and a UNESCO World Heritage site, we found several Giant Orchids, Himantoglossum robertianum, in full flower. It is the earliest flowering orchid of the region where it thrives on the lime-rich soil. Several Blackcaps were singing as spring starts a little earlier in the South; we also saw and heard a pair of Firecrests. To get a closer look I played a short burst of song on my cell phone but the territorial male was most indignant! He raised his orange crest, thrust his head forward and sang loudly. This was a truly magical moment.

During our visit we also saw over 1,000 Greater flamingos, many of which were engaged in their mating displays, flocks of Glossy ibis and migrating flocks of Common cranes. A few Clouded yellow butterflies appeared and we were fortunate to see at least three Red squirrels. Provence is a wonderful place to find all sorts of wildlife but lack of space prevents me from recording all that we saw during our stay. The food and wine are not too bad either!

Report of March Meeting

Our Speaker was Catherine Buchanan who talked to us about the history of food and the great British tea ceremony. She started by telling us that at one time there was no cuttery. Small pieces of very sharp flint were used to cut food. In time a handle was added. It was not until the 16th century that forks were in use. The lower classes had no cuttery as such but made crude knives made from flint, stone or metals. Peasants used their bread to eat their food instead.

In the middle ages trestle tables were used, covered with a cloth which was used for wiping hands and mouths.

In later times table manners and table cutlery became a status symbol. Every new eating, carving or serving implement invented was a must have by the upper classes to show their social standing.

Catherine had a vast collection of knives – butter, cheese, fish, tea etc. Forks and spoons were also changing frequently and the well heeled just had to have them to show that they too were of a high social standing.

The tea ceremony itself had strict rules. If invited you had to remember that it was a light snack NOT a meal. Always served with a white linen napkin, delicate sandwiches first, white bread, only the lower classes ate brown, then scones you NEVER sliced your scone you broke it and then applied jam and butter, the order of which did not seem to be important. Finally, a sweet treat, only a mouthful. The hostess always had the handle of her silver tea pot pointed to her for ease of pouring, milk first only because the finest bone China tea cups might crack with the heat of the tea. When tea was over you would refold your napkin to a triangle and if the point of the napkin pointed towards your plate then it showed that you would like to be invited again, if the point was away from your plate then you would rather not come again

Catherine gave us a very amusing talk, very tongue in cheek, which had us laughing at such rules . What would the people of those times think of our Costa Coffee, Starbucks refreshment places now?

The next meting of Barton Mills Ladies' Club is on Tuesday, 9th April at 2.30 when Amanda Sutherland will return to tell us the next part of her exciting life and career.


