#### Reflection from Revd Gill

What a year it has been! First I had to clear my mothers' flat as she moved into residential care and then I had to help my sister to empty and store the contents of her garage in preparation for building work! On top of that we have items from my nephew stored together with a growing mountain of goods from my children who do not seem to have the room (or inclination!) to sort it for themselves!

It made me wonder why we hang on to so much 'stuff' – and don't get me wrong, my long-suffering husband will tell you I can be the worst offender!

Of course, some things hold precious memories and need to be kept but as I check my overflowing garage, I can see so much is just 'clutter'. Goodness knows how much money is represented in the mountains of discarded goods currently decaying in the garage.


# NEW CHURCH GATES A CORONATION YEAR PROJECT

If we woke up Christmas morning and found no **presents** under the tree most of us would be upset! We plan for weeks what we are going to give our parents, grandparents, children, aunts and uncles and friends, and they too would be distressed if **a gift** was not produced by the 25th December.

I read several years ago about a woman who hurriedly purchased 50 Christmas cards without looking at the message inside. She quickly signed and addressed all but one, and then dropped them in a mailbox. Imagine her dismay when later she glanced inside the one unmailed card and read these words. "This card is just to say a little gift is on the way". No doubt there were 49 people wondering what happened to their presents.

God made a promise of a gift in Isaiah 7 v 14 "Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His Name Immanuel." Again in Isaiah 9 v 6 we read "For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given...." Did God keep his promise? He certainly did for we read in the New Testament, Galatians 4 v 4 "When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son". As we celebrate this Christmas by giving our gifts to family and friends, let's thank God that He meant what He said – He not only promised, but He also gave "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift" (2 Corinthians 9 v 15).

As we enter the new year, 2024, let us put our trust in Jesus Christ for our salvation - we can be sure that God will keep His Word. In Hebrews 10 v 23 it says "He who promised is faithful". The author of the book of Hebrews encouraged believers to boldly "draw near" to God, confident that He has accepted us and our sins have been forgiven (v 22) and we are to encourage one another to be faithful to Him because we know that He will one day return for us (v 24 and 25).



### **NATURE NOTES.**

Folklore, legends and myths

#### Santa's Reindeer

With Christmas approaching we think of Reindeer. They have been domesticated for over 2,000 years. The story of Father Christmas dates back to the 4th Century but reindeer were only introduced as part of a children's story published in the 19th Century. In 1814 Professor Clement Clarke Moore penned a poem called 'The night before Christmas' in which Santa's sleigh was pulled by eight male reindeer. Their names, all male, will no doubt be familiar. However, Moore failed to realise that male reindeer shed their antlers after the mating season. Any reindeer seen in winter with antlers would be female! Still, why let the truth get in the way of a good story?

The Eagle and Child

A popular one for a public house, this name is derived from a legend well-known in several European countries. Several variations exist but the English version from the 14th Century tells of Sir Thomas Lathom who had not been blessed with a male heir. On a stroll through Tarlescough Woods with his wife they heard a baby crying. Servants were dispatched to retrieve the child which was found in the nest of a Golden eagle! They brought the baby up as their own son, naming him 'Oskatel'. Whilst a female eagle is capable of carrying a small baby I think that story is stretching it a bit!

#### The Rowan tree

Possibly in Scotland more than south of the border the Rowan tree is seen as a bringer of good luck. In fact, it is deemed to be very unlucky to cut one down. A hardy species, it can grow anywhere in Britain; it is very common in the North. The Norse connection with Scotland is well documented; the Viking invaders left their mark on the language and culture but what is not so well known is the story of the Norse god Thor. The god of thunder and light is said to have nearly drowned having fallen into a fast-flowing river, when a Rowan tree bent its branches down allowing him to scramble to safety.

Magpies

The familiar rhyme is "one for sorrow, two for joy, three for a girl, four for a boy, five for silver, six for gold, seven for a secret never to be told". Generally, seeing a lone magpie is supposed to bring bad luck. Could this be because they often mate for life so seeing one alone may mean it's lost its mate and therefore the chance of bad luck is higher? However, if you salute and say "Good morning general" or "Good morning captain" then all will be well!

The story of Magpies stealing rings and other shiny objects really is a myth. Researchers at Exeter University put this idea to the test in a controlled study

in 2019. Like most of the crow family they are curious and will often pick up small objects but as for keeping them well, that is a real porker! They are more likely to steal your lunch than your jewellery.

#### Poisonous plants

No William Shakespeare play would be complete without some poor soul meeting a nasty end from poisoning. Belladonna and Hemlock are featured but Hamlet's father was killed by a noxious substance called 'Hebenon'. Scholars have been arguing for centuries as to what 'Hebenon' actually is. The truth is, no-one really knows. If you can tell me then please let me know.

#### **Bird Migration**

For centuries bird migration remained a mystery, even to that famous amateur naturalist the Reverend Gilbert White who wrote 'The natural history of Selborne'. As Swallows gathered in reed beds around lakes and ponds in autumn, then vanished, people put two and two together but came up with five. They surmised that Swallows hibernated in the mud at the bottom of ponds! Not until explorers ventured into the African continent was it realised our Swallows merely travelled south for the winter but returned in the spring. Another legend of bird migration is the stories about Goldcrests who hitched a ride inside the plumage of Woodcocks in order to cross the North Sea. Amazingly, we know that millions of Goldcrests from Scandinavia migrate across the sea in autumn completely unaided. These tiny birds, weighing only as much as a twenty pence piece, repeat the journey in the opposite direction in spring time.

There is one final story I must tell though. Some years ago my wife and I were on holiday in the Pyrenees and whilst driving through a valley we spotted a young Griffon vulture sitting on the ground. It looked a bit distressed so we stopped to investigate. As we reached the bird it appeared to be in good condition then suddenly an elderly French farmer carrying a large wooden rake approached. He looked a bit menacing so I asked him what he intended to do. He spoke no English but kept saying "Ils mangent les vaches!" (They eat cows). I explained they are protected birds and not to harm it. He seemed determined to beat it to death so we ran at the vulture at which it took off and managed to get up onto a thermal up-current. Vultures feed on dead cattle of course but killing one? Never in a million years!


