Christmas 2025

“And for us this the end of all the stories, and we can most truly say that they all lived happily ever after. But for them it was only the beginning of the real story. All their life in this world and all their adventures in Narnia had only been the cover and the title page: now at last they were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read: which goes on for ever: in which every chapter is better than the one before.”

In *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* the writer and scholar C.S. Lewis retells the Easter Story. Aslan is Jesus. He dies for Edmund and is raised from death. In the last of the Narnia stories, *The Last Battle*, he retells the end of the Christian Story – that Jesus came so that we might be part of an eternity without evil or pain and where our relationship with God is restored.

I love those words I quoted -the very last words of *The Last Battle*. In part this is because I have loved the Narnia stories from childhood, even though I was an atheist then. But now, as a Christian, I find that they are able to say something which I find difficult to put into words, but which is so key to understanding what Christianity is actually about.

The four weeks preceding Christmas are called Advent. We tend to think of Advent only in terms of Chocolate (or other) Advent Calendars, counting down the days until Christmas Day. But Advent is really about looking much further forward and into the very purpose of Christmas itself and what it means for us.

Jesus came at Christmas with a twofold purpose. Firstly, to die for us on the cross and be raised from death so that we might begin a relationship with the Father, no longer separated from him. Secondly it was so that we might be able to be part of his eternal plan, which is so much greater than we can imagine. But we can't receive the second part without accepting the first. We must accept Jesus' gift of his life on the cross to be able to receive the gift of eternity, because without that we are still separated from God.

So this Christmas as we focus on the first part of the story – the birth of the baby Jesus, let us remember the second part – Jesus' death on the Cross and look forward to the last part – that God hopes that we might be with him into eternity. “All our life in this world had only been the cover and the title page: now at last we were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read: which goes on for ever: in which every chapter is better than the one before.”




The Friends of St Mary's Barton Mills

ELECTIONS POSTAL VOTE APPLICATIONS

Residents who applied for their postal vote on or before 31 January 2024 and wish to continue with this arrangement will need to reapply for their postal vote before 31 January 2026.

The implementation of Elections Act 2022 means that a postal vote can only be held for a maximum of three years. Some residents will have already been contacted digitally via the Gov.Uk notify service and those that have not re-applied will be invited to re-apply again. For those residents that West Suffolk Council do not hold email addresses for or who have not re-applied will be sent a written notice to their registered address inviting them to re-apply.

Any electors that do not re-apply for their postal vote, will have their postal vote removed on 31 January 2026.

Residents can reapply for their postal vote by visiting: www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote

The next Parish Council meetings will be held on **Tuesday 2nd December and Tuesday 6th January 2026, starting at 7:30pm** in the Village Hall. If we woke up Christmas morning and found no **presents** under the tree, most of us would be upset! We plan for weeks what we are going to give our parents, grandparents, children, aunts and uncles, and they too would be distressed if a **gift** was not produced by the 25th December.

I read several years ago about a woman who hurriedly purchased 50 Christmas cards without looking at the message inside. She quickly signed and addressed all but one, and then dropped them in a mailbox. Imagine her dismay when later she glanced inside the one unmailed card and read these words. *“This card is just to say a little gift is on the way”*. No doubt there were 49 people wondering what happened to their presents.

God made a promise of a gift in Isaiah 7 v 14 **“Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His Name Immanuel.”** Again in Isaiah 9 v 6 we read **“For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given.....”** **Did God keep his promise? 

Ladies Club – November Meeting

We welcomed the return of Fran Saltmarsh. On this occasion she was going to tell us about the 'Roaring Twenties'.

She began by telling us that in the years prior to this, women were fighting for the right to vote. Life was quite restricting for women, in more ways than one. They were beginning to take part in some sports but limited by the clothing that they were wearing which was in the current fashion.

Tightly corseted, long skirts, several petticoats, large feather bedecked hats which made cycling, tennis, archery even going for a walk difficult. With the onset of World War One many women took to working on the land and forestry. Their clothing had to change to make life more bearable. Looser clothing, shorter skirts and no heavy corsets.

After the war clothing styles took a further step forward - out went the stiff straight lines of the dresses and coats, out went the corsets and hem lines went up. As women were now receiving a wage, they were now earning money. Well off ladies had an allowance for their clothing, with their new found income they were demanding more style in what they wanted to wear. They had a sense of independence, they also now had the vote. No longer was long hair the norm, shorter bobs and perms, high heeled shoes, small hats instead of enormous creations. Their busts were flattened to give long slender lines, fabric was cut on the bias to give dresses and skirts flowing lines. The coming of small affordable sewing machines meant women were now making and creating their own fashions and buying paper patterns. There were adverts in magazines for deodorants, face powder, Marcel hair waving. Coco Chanel was having a huge influence too, which was only affordable by the well off. This filtered down through magazines. She was an advocate of costume jewellery which meant women were now able to be the height of fashion relatively cheaply.

Once again, Fran captured our attention all the time she was talking. All of us delighted, I should be thankful that we were not sitting in tightly fitting corsets !!!!!

Nature notes December/January.

As I write this piece the weather has turned much colder and there is even a possibility of snow! By now our hedgehogs should be hibernating, so if you see one out and about, especially during the day, it could be in trouble. If it looks lethargic, underweight or poorly then rescue could be necessary. Hogs need to weigh about 500g or more to overwinter, any less than that and they won't survive.

If your hedgehog needs help there are several rescue centres in this area or contact a local veterinarian. They all usually require you to take the hog to them, so don your gardening gloves and place it in a cardboard box for transportation and keep it warm. It may respond to feeding, so dog or cat food is appropriate (NOT bread and milk!).

As the autumn leaves fall we tend to tidy them up pretty quickly but what do we do with the leaves? Brown bins work but there are alternatives. Bonfires can be a bit anti-social, especially when leaves are wet. However, we may be missing a trick. I suggest composting is the best solution. You don't need a bin to compost leaves; a simple leaf mould container made from four wooden stakes and a length of wire netting will suffice. Apart from making leaf mould, this will also provide a home for an amazing array of wildlife. Home made compost is also environmentally friendly.

Let's recognise the value of the humble earth worm. Worms do a very important job in the soil and throughout your compost. Bacteria and fungi help to break down the material, but worms accelerate this process by digesting organic matter. The resulting waste contains enzymes which act as growth promoters for plants. If you mix worm casts from your lawn with your potting compost your plants will flourish. There are about 30 species of worms in the British Isles, but the most useful by far is the Brandling or Tiger worm. This little red powerhouse works away in your compost and, if conditions are right, will multiply many times over.


Bacteria also deserve a mention; their activity generates heat which accelerates decomposition. By mixing brown leaves with fresh grass mowings and stirring about once a week I managed to get

the temperature of my compost to 70 degrees Centigrade – hot enough to kill off weed seeds and any nasty pathogens. The worms didn't like the high temperature, so they migrated down into the soil until it cooled down!

In the past I have found a whole host of wildlife in compost heaps; Grass snakes lay their leathery eggs in rotting compost, so they are incubated by the heat generated. Slow worms also like compost but they give birth to live young. If your heap is open to the air you may find Blackbirds, Robins or even Song thrushes searching for food. You may find the odd fungus popping up too; Recently, we found a beautiful earth star fungus in leaf mould at Lackford Lakes nature reserve.

The winter birds have been arriving in above-average numbers this year. There appears to have been an irruption of Crossbills from Europe as they are much more obvious nationwide. There has been a flock of about twelve at Lackford for several weeks but, as their preferred food is pine kernels, they are more likely to be seen in Thetford Forest. Large numbers of Blackbirds also arrived from Northern Europe in late November so you may have seen more than usual recently. Waxwings are also present in good numbers in Scotland at present so, fingers crossed, we may see some here later in the winter.



Community Speed Watch (CWS)
