Vicar's Letter

"Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow."

Albert Einstein

As we commemorate Remembrance Day 2024, we look back eighty years. The allied forces were deep into occupied Europe – knocking on the doors of Germany itself from both West and East and the tide in the Pacific well and truly turned.

How different things looked three and four years earlier, when the UK battled on its own, and although the German planes had been defeated and the danger of invasion less imminent, things seemed very dark indeed. What keeps us going when times are tough, and problems seem overwhelming? Hope. Hope helps us carry on – that things will be different. Hope energises and encourages – that our actions will make a difference. Hope motivates us – that evil and darkness can be overcome. Hope is not a feeling, but a spur to action, an inspiration to build a better world. Hope is lighting the candle despite the dark storm swirling.

As I write, our world seems to have many dark storms swirling – the ongoing carnage in the Ukraine and the conflict in Israel/Palestine/Lebanon, let alone the ever increasing impact of global warming.

We have inherited the fruit of the hope of those who fought in WW2, that the evil of Nazism and the Japanese Empire could be defeated. Where do we find hope in the face of the dark storms of today, that will bear fruit for future generations?

For Christians, hope is not found in an emotion, but a person – Jesus. That when we come to know his good news, he can bring hope to our lives, and by transforming us, bring hope and healing to our world. (That's why almost all food banks in the UK were set up by Christians – to bring hope and healing to those suffering from poverty.)

I believe that despite the dark storms that face our world now, we can still have hope, and that God intends each one of us to know that hope for ourselves.

As we commemorate on Remembrance Sunday those who served and those who were lost in World War 1, World War 2 and conflicts since, may we learn from yesterday, live for today and discover hope for tomorrow.

November 11th is the day we remember **to give** thanks for all those men and women who sacrificed so much during **the two World Wars** and other conflicts since. **We remember them with** gratitude as it gave each one of us **the freedom** we enjoy in our country today.

How good is your memory? Having worked at RAF Mildenhall for 63 years I met countless people from all over the world. Often they returned to the UK, on business or vacation, and it was good to renew acquaintance, however, it got increasingly more difficult for me to remember their names. I prided myself on remembering each one of them and their children's names but unfortunately now it is not so good. Although forgetfulness increases with age, it's really common to everyone. Even children have lapses of memory, how often have you heard a child say "I forgot". In a world of cell phones and speed dialing, our ability to remember may be short-circuited by reliance on technological gadgets. We don't need to remember all the numbers of our family and friends, all we need to do today is just push a button.

Letting a phone number slip our minds or to forget a face is trivial, but keeping a mental grip on God's Word is of the utmost importance. Many years ago now my father was losing his sight, he gave thanks daily that early in life he had been taught in both Sunday and Day school to remember portions of Scripture. It was part of their weekly lessons to learn texts from the Bible and to recite them publicly.

The Psalmist said, "Thy Word I have hid in mine heart that I might not sin against Thee", "I will meditate in Thy precepts, and have respect unto Thy ways" and "I will not forget Thy Word", all these wonderful verses are found in the longest Psalm 119, verses 11 and 15-16.

ST MARY'S, BARTON MILLS, PRESERVATION CHARITABLE TRUST



Dear Barton Millers,

I am taking this opportunity to explain, for the benefit of new village residents, the history and purpose of our organisation.

The main aim of the St Mary's Church, Barton Mills, Preservation Charitable Trust is to raise funds for the maintenance of the building that is at the centre of our village: the 800 year old parish church. The intention is that the building can be kept in good structural and decorative order and can be used for a variety of community events as well as for Sunday services.

The Trust was founded in 1996, and, over the years has raised many thousands of pounds, especially from the Scarecrow Festivals, which have mostly been organised by The Preservation Trust, as well as Quiz Nights, concerts of both classical and modern music and raffles of which the final proceeds have added to the Trust's funds.

Money has been spent on many projects, including past restoration of stonework, protection of the stained-glass windows; drainage by the north wall, conservation of the 'Good Shepherd' mural and installation of a major new boiler to heat the church. More recently we have improved the lighting around the outside of the building and had walls re-mortared and plastered with lime-based materials.

We work very hard in the background to put on events that we hope give pleasure to our members whilst being effective in fundraising. The committee is currently very small, with 3 officers and 3 other members, meeting bi-monthly. We would dearly like to hear from anyone who feels they could contribute ideas, time (roughly 3 times a year) for events, and an injection of good spirits to our small band of trustees. Report of October 2024 Meeting

This month we were sadly let down by our speaker, but Catherine Buchanan kindly stepped in at the last minute. She gave an interesting and sometimes amusing talk on six prominent women from Bury St. Edmunds. The first was Norah Lofts, the historical novelist. She also used pseudonyms to write in several other genres, just to show she could. Elia Jovce Cockram MD was the first female doctor in Bury St Edmunds and set up the first blood bank in England in the town. Eva Wollaston Greene (nee Boughev) was the first woman to serve as a councillor, the first female Mayor of Bury St Edmunds and the town's first female Magistrate. Rose Mead was a prolific artist who exhibited at the Royal Academy summer exhibition and the Paris Salon, returning to look after her aged parents after study at the Lincoln School of Art and then the Westminster School of Art, as was expected of the youngest daughter. She earned her living painting local dignitaries at her studio 18 Crown Street. Eleanor Wadsworth (nee Fish) was Britain's last surviving WWII female pilot and flew hundreds of missions delivering war planes including 132 Spitfires which became her favourite plane. She flew 22 different types of aircraft, from Spitfires and Hurricanes to Tiger Moths; she died in 2020 aged 103. Winifred Challis spent most of her life in West Suffolk and during the Second World War was one of nearly five hundred people who kept a diary for the social research organisation Mass Observation. For several months in 1942-43 she immersed herself in diary-writing, producing commentaries on wartime life in and around Bury St Edmunds.

NATURE NOTES

NOVEMBER

All eyes looked to the sky in mid-October when we were able to see the Aurora Borealis or 'Northern Lights'. This bright pink and green spectacle is rarely visible this far south but an exceptionally strong geomagnetic or 'Solar' storm created a much brighter display. No need to go to Iceland or Norway this year!

As if that weren't enough, and about the same time, we witnessed Comet C/2023 also known as Tsuchinshan-ATLAS passing Earth. Although it is only 3.2km in diameter, and some 85 million km from us, it was clearly visible with the naked eye. If you missed it you won't get another chance as it will not re-appear for another 80,000 years!

The October weather was incredibly mild so very few trees are displaying their full autumn colour yet. As temperatures drop the green chlorophyll fades revealing red, orange or yellow depending on the species of tree. Field maple is one of the first to change with its bright yellow leaves on show in hedges and woodland everywhere. The crimson leaves of Dogwood give one of the best displays in my view.


Colder weather and shorter days farther north trigger bird migration; strong north-easterly winds in early October brought a host of rare and unusual birds to our shores. Many species which do not breed in the UK were forced across the North Sea. Rare vagrants such as Barred warbler. Radde's warbler, Red-breasted flycatcher, Red-flanked bluetail and Yellow-browed warbler appeared in good numbers; most of these species come from Eastern Europe or Siberia. More common species such as Fieldfare and Redwing also started to arrive in big numbers in mid-October. They should now be visible in our fields and hedgerows.

One feature of bird migration is that many familiar species we see in our gardens may also be incoming migrants from Scandinavia or Northern Europe. Thousands of Robins pass through southern Norway and Sweden in autumn to winter in the UK. Goldcrests also undertake the perilous journey to us to escape cold weather. These tiny birds, weighing just 5 grammes (the weight of a 20 pence piece)

migrate in their thousands, possibly millions, to come here. So that Goldcrest or Robin you see in your garden may be a foreigner.

This is the month when Hedgehogs start to hibernate so don't forget to check your bonfire before lighting it! Happy wildlife watching!
