### Vicar's Letter



### November 2025

The Rise of Homo Idioticus: Are We Getting More Stupid?
This was the title of an article in Psychology Today in June
this year, with the subtitle "Science shows that our cognitive capabilities are in decline."

Apparently, IQs are on the decline (and have been since about 1975), function illiteracy is on the rise, and that lives lived online come at a cognitive cost.

I'm not going to lean into the debate over whether previous generations were better off before smartphones, (not least because the start of the decline predates them by 35 years, and complaints about the next generation can be found as far back as 2400BC in ancient Egypt). But I am wondering what it means for the act of remembering. When we rely on our phones and digital devices to do the remembering for us, it easily becomes an act without meaning. Unless we are reminded to remember by our devices we forget.

November contains three traditional dates where we are invited to stop and remember – the Christian festivals of All Saints and All Souls, and the national Act of Remembrance on 11<sup>th</sup> November and the nearest Sunday (this year the 9<sup>th</sup>). If we don't stop and remember then the flow of time just takes us on and we neither remember and honour those whose sacrifice bought us life, nor remember and learn how to work towards peace. The actions and lives of previous generations become even more opaque and forgotten.

So, this year, I invite you to take the time to actively remember by participating in the village act of remembrance on **Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> November at 10:45** at the **Peace Garden by the Village Hall**. Come and join the others from the village who stop to remember, stop to honour, stop to commit to work to peace. Don't be one of the many who drive past, or spend time at Sainsburys, or at a sports event and who forget. For a short time, let's put our phones down, get out of our cars, stop our lives and make a determined effort to remember.

### The Barton Mills Peace Garden

In 1995 cities, towns and villages across the United Kingdom commemorated 50 years since the ending of the second World War. Barton Mills did not have a designated war Memorial so Glynn East, a Parish Councillor at the time, proposed and subsequently designed and supervised the construction of a Peace Garden along with a new Village Hall/Playing Field car park.

In November 1995 the first Act of Remembrance at the Peace Garden was led by Glynn under the auspices of St Mary's Parish Church, Barton Mills in his role as a Church

Lay Elder.

Glýnn has led the annual service for the past 30 years and over the time the attendance has grown and nowadays it is a well-established and much cherished

village event

The service includes the laying of wreaths by veterans, and members of the Parish council together with a basket of white flowers laid by a child to represent the children and young people of the village.

This year marks 80 years since the ending of the war but sadly due to illness Glynn is unable to lead the 2025 service, but it will take place as usual on Remembrance

Sunday.

### **The Davies Charity 2025**

The Davies Charity is a historical Barton Mills charity. In the past few years we have made a small Christmas monetary donation to help those in need in our village who are 70 years of age or over and have lived in the village for at least 5 years. Even when life seems overwhelming, we can cry out to the Lord and find His deliverance from our distress. ### Ladies Club - October Meeting

Catherine Buchanan made a welcome return and her topic was 'Must have Christmas Presents'.

She started her talk by telling us that rubber ducks bought for babies as a play toy in the bath are no longer deemed safe .... water collecting in them could gather bacteria and harm the child. Who would have thought that this harmless toy would pose such a danger? During her talk she shattered our illusions about toys completely. Good House Keeping and Hamleys decide early in the year just what the 'Must Have Toy' will be for Christmas. Over the years fashions have changed, TV programmes feature largely, cinemas franchises, more and more technology is involved.

The giving and receiving of toys has gone on throughout the ages. Christmas gifts are given at different times throughout history. Pope Julius 1st declared that 25th December should be the date to celebrate the birth of Jesus. In Scandinavia and Europe 6th December, St Nicholas Day, presents are given to children.

Catherine gave us a potted history of toys that have been popular throughout the years.

In the 1700's jigsaws and board games were thought to be educational so were much favoured. Some toys were only played with on Sundays and considered suitable, such as a Noah's Ark. Pre- first world war most toys were made in Germany, that had to change, British makers then had to develop their own play things. She went through names of toys familiar to us during our childhood - Hornby trains sets, snakes and ladders, Pelham puppets, play doh, Sooty and Sweep, Cindy and Ken, Spirographs, the list was endless and we all reacted in the same way, bringing back memories from either our own childhoods or buying these toys for children and grand children.

The biggest shock was when she told us just how much some of these toys are now worth. Anyone who watches any antique programmes knows that there is often more value in the box than the toy. The latest craze is kidult - adults who buy toys for themselves and collecting toys. Jonathon Ross is said to have the largest collection toys. Buying and collecting toys is an expensive hobby!!!

### NATURE NOTES November

I get very little feedback from readers as to whether they follow up on my advice about wildlife watching. It would be good to hear from you!

With Guy Fawkes Night approaching, a timely reminder about hedgehogs is appropriate. If you are having a fireworks party and bonfire, please check before lighting that you have no hedgehogs hibernating. With the mild weather so far this autumn, they may not be going into hibernation just yet. Feeding your hogs is also a good thing to do at this time as they need to put on fat reserves before winter. They will eat cat food, either wet or dry.

A dead Cherry tree was recently taken down in Church Meadow. Before it was felled I saw it had a large, golden Chicken of the Woods fungus growing on one side. This edible fungus is fairly common and grows on both live and dead trees. Another fungus to look out for is Jelly Ear. Mainly found on Elderberry bushes it has a striking pink colour and looks remarkably like a human ear. There are thousands of different species of fungi visible at this time of year — you may be surprised if you look!

Starlings are forming autumn flocks now. Murmurations will start building up as the nights grow longer; some flocks can reach hundreds of thousands. Good places to see a murmuration are Suffolk Wildlife Trust sites Lackford Lakes, Redgrave and Lopham Fen and Hen Reedbeds. RSPB Minsmere on the coast is also a good site. It's best to arrive about 30 mins. before sunset to witness the spectacle.

Grey seals have their pups between October and January with peak months being November and December. A good place to see them is Horsey Beach in Norfolk. This is a traditional site and close views of adult seals and their young can be had. The much larger males are ready to mate again and can be quite aggressive so it's best not to get too close.

The changing leaf colour is one of the best features of autumn with the reds of Dogwood and Cherry and yellow of Field Maple. Fruits and berries can be just as interesting too. Red Hawthorn berries, black berries of Buckthorn and Wild privet and golden Crab apples all look lovely. In my view these are outshone by the fruits of Spindle - bright cerise pink fruits which open up to show bright orange seeds inside. The leaves of Spindle bushes also turn a bright crimson in autumn.

With the summer migrant birds already gone their place is filled by the winter arrivals. Blackbirds, Fieldfares, Redwings and Song thrushes in their thousands have joined us from as far afield as Northern Europe and Russia. They will happily search for food on the ground until freezing conditions force them to feed on berries; there is a good crop this year. Finches are represented by Goldfinches, Redpolls and Siskins. Redpolls in particular have turned up in huge numbers this autumn; a small finch, slightly smaller than a Goldfinch, they are mainly brown with a red cap and a black chin. These finches are happy to patronise your garden bird feeders with a particular liking for Sunflower hearts.

You may have heard Tawny owls calling in the late evening. They are now pairing up ready for the nesting season. Tawnies are mainly nocturnal unlike other owls which are crepuscular (feeding around dawn and dusk). The exception to nocturnal activity is the Short-eared owl. This bird is diurnal i.e. it hunts during the day. It breeds in small numbers in the UK but numbers increase in winter with migrants mainly coming from Scandinavia. The best place to see Short eared owls are large, open areas of grassland where they can find small rodents. Burwell Fen in Cambridgeshire is the best site locally.



### Affordable Housing in the Village

Barton Mills Parish Council are (subject to planning approval) hoping to construct an affordable housing scheme just off the Newmarket Road in the village. The scheme is called an "exception site" and is specifically designed to provide affordable rental and shared ownership (part purchase) homes for people with a proven housing need and a connection to the village (local connection). It is a group of just 15 properties consisting of one, two and three bedrooms, detached, semi-detached and terraced bungalows and houses.

The Parish Council are trying to reconfirm the level of housing needs for this scheme and also to collate a list of interested parties who will be contacted as the scheme proceeds. The Parish Council are hoping to achieve planning consent late 2025. With the properties available late 2026/early 2027

In order to be added to the list of interested parties please contact the Barton Mills Parish Council Clerk. The Parish Council will just require some basic details (name, address, contact details and local connection).

The affordable rental properties will have rents set at social housing levels. This is designed to allow people with a local connection to Barton Mills to return to the village, which they would otherwise not have been able to do so. The shared ownership properties will be offered under the modern rules which allow a much-improved process and conditions for buyers. It will allow purchasers get "onto the housing ladder" in Barton Mills with a brand-new home.

The initial "registration of interest" carries no costs or obligations and the Parish Council encourages all interested parties to come forward.
