Vicar's Letter

It is October once again and that means Harvest time. God is so generous in his provision of all we need and we have much to celebrate for his generosity to us. Sadly, although God has provided a harvest of plenty in the world, human greed and selfishness result in two problems. One is that war and conflict reduce production, as we are experiencing now in the Ukraine. The other is that this wealth is very unevenly distributed. The deaths from hunger we hear about most often are those caused by famine and wars but this actually accounts for only 10% of all hunger deaths. The majority are caused by chronic malnutrition with families facing such extreme poverty they are simply not able to get enough food to eat.

About 24,000 people die every day from hunger or hunger-related causes and three quarters of these deaths are children under the age of five. In total, twelve million children die every year - over half due to malnutrition. In the UK there has been a push to increase the quality of school dinners as it is now recognized that poor quality nutrition leads to a deterioration in children's health, a lowering of concentration in lessons and subsequent under-achievement. The UK is, by and large, a rich country but the Trussell Trust reported that the number of people using foodbanks rose from 26,000 in 2008/09 to approximately 2.99 million people in 2022/23.

It doesn't have to be like this. The world produces around 300 kilogrammes of grain per person per year, enough to feed everyone if the food were shared equally and used efficiently. The major problem is having the right food, in the right place, at the right time - all the time. This means eradicating two evils. The first is the extreme scarcity of food some people in our world have to endure. The second is the extreme poverty so many people live in. Individual programmes can mitigate the effects of poverty. However, we also need people to speak up for and with those who are marginalised so that the policies which cause poverty to flourish can be changed and the underlying causes addressed.

PARKING ON THE STREET

Barton Mills Parish Council would like to request that people who park on The Street, are considerate of residents and that they do not park opposite driveways, as this is making it extremely difficult for those pulling out of the driveways to see, which is very dangerous. There have been a number of 'near misses' because of people parking opposite driveways.

FIVE GUYS/OLD MILL LANE

The disabled access footpath from Old Mill Lane to the path along the river, is NOT a Public Right of Way, this footpath goes through the land that Five Guys are using for their car park and drive through. The Parish Council, along with residents asked Five Guys if they would consider installing a new footpath to help those who cannot use the steps, access the river footpath.

Five Guys listened, took on board the comments made and have now confirmed that access to the footpath can be made via a new footpath which starts at Old Mill Lane, through Five Guys car park which then leads to the existing footpath along the river.

Please note that Old Mill Lane is not an appropriate place to park when visiting Five Guys or any parking for long periods of stay.

The next Parish Council meetings will be **held on Tuesday 3rd October and Tuesday 7th November at 7:30pm** in the Village Hall. In the event of an extraordinary meeting being held before the next scheduled meeting, it will be published on the website and on the notice boards. Later a move to Basildon and then several moves within Suffolk and Norfolk now settled, for the time being, in Lavenham.

He read several of his poems, clearly showing his love of nature and the world around him from early boyhood. Before each poem he gave us an explanation and background of each. His first poem was 'Teasel' and how it was an important tool used in the preparation of wool in East Anglia. He said that these days machines are used but for the finest quality a teasel is still used.

He was a keen bird watcher and read a couple of poems that he had written about the birds he had seen. He told us of his early days growing up in the East End of London and one poem he had written was of his grandmother who he called 'kangaroo 'because like all the women at that time wore an apron with a large pocket at the front, reminiscent of the pouch of the animal, which held untold mysteries like sweets, coins, bits of string etc. etc.

His poems were easy to listen to and he had a good sense of humour which made it a very relaxing afternoon.

The Summer holidays are behind us, children are back at school and normal work and leisure activities resumed. However minds start to turn to the next half of the year with the prospect of late autumn weather, winter challenges and the start of Spring 2024. For many it will be a challenging time with the rises that we have seen in the cost of living, especially around food, housing-associated expenses and fuel (home and travel). For some it will be a period when families may be able to visit less often, leading to feelings of isolation and loneliness.

The Good Neighbour Scheme can provide support to those in our community who are feeling isolated through our volunteers calling in for a chat on a regular basis. We are also able to put villagers in touch with other appropriate support organisations in cases where we are not equipped to provide specialist help. This is done through our links with a County-wide support network. We can also help with collecting shopping and prescriptions – see the full list of our services on offer in our advertisement in this edition of the Barton Miller.

NATURE NOTES The aliens have landed!

No, we are not talking about little green men and women from outer space but non-native species from other parts of the World. Which of the following are aliens and which are native? Asian hornet, Black swan, Box tree moth, Budgerigar, Butterfly bush, Canada goose, Chinese water deer, Common pheasant, Coypu, Edible dormouse, Egyptian goose, European pond terrapin, Fallow deer, Giant hogweed, Golden pheasant, Grey squirrel, Himalayan balsam, Japanese knotweed, Little owl, Mandarin duck, Marsh frog, Mink, Mitten crab, Monk parakeet, Muntjac, New Zealand pygmy weed, Oregon grape, Rabbit, Rainbow trout, Red-legged partridge, Reeve's pheasant, Rhododendron, Ring-necked parakeet, Ruddy duck, Russian vine, Sika deer, Signal crayfish, Spanish bluebell, Topmouth gudgeon and Water primrose? The answer, of course, is that they are all aliens

Some introductions are so familiar to us we may believe they are native; the Little owl for example is a Victorian introduction that filled a vacant niche not important to any other owl or bird of prey. As it feeds mainly on worms and insects it is not in competition with other species. The Fallow deer was brought here by the Normans around 1100AD. Rabbits were brought by the Romans. The Rainbow trout is a North American species originally bred in fish farms for nearly 100 years but now found in our rivers.


Most of our familiar garden plants are outsiders. The Victorians were great plant-hunters who brought some fantastic plants home with them. Other plants arrived as the result of travel and trade. Roses and crocuses both originate from central Asia while crocuses came from central and

southern Europe and beyond. However, some very bad decisions were made by plant hunters too! Due to their invasive nature Himalayan balsam and Japanese knotweed are wreaking havoc in our countryside.

Useful herbs like Garden mint, Garden thyme, Marjoram, Parsley, Rosemary and Sage are all mainly from the Mediterranean region, probably brought here by the Romans. Garlic's arrival from central Asia can be attributed to the Crusaders. Surprisingly, Rhubarb is a native of Russia and Western China but was smuggled into Scotland from Moscow in the 1700s by a Doctor James Mounsey who had ties with the Russian court.

So not all alien species are good and not all aliens are bad but how do you feel about reintroductions? Birds like Common cranes, Ospreys and White-tailed eagles are now re-colonising their former habitats with a little help from us. They would have been widespread centuries ago before being persecuted into near extinction. But how do you feel about bringing back some species that were here even further back like Beavers, Wolves, Wild-boar, Lynx or Bison? It may not be feasible or even desirable as our countryside has changed so much in the intervening years since these species were first here. Wild-boar already has a self-sustaining population in the West Country; Beavers may be close behind. As for the rest, I'll leave it for you to decide!

I've never heard of circle dancing.

Modern circle dance draws on the rich and diverse traditional dances of many countries, including the Balkans, Greece, Israel, Russia, and France. There is also a growing repertoire of new dances to classical music and contemporary songs.

Circle dances can be energetic and lively or gentle and reflective, but the aim is always to enjoy dancing with others and to create a sense of well-being and community through enjoyable gentle (mostly!) exercise to lovely world music.

Can I do it?


